The reluctant warrior became a fearsome, revered All Black prop, and captained and coached the Maori All Blacks. His insights on rugby, and its place in New Zealand life, are unique. The journey Bill takes readers on in Billy Bush is not all about playing rugby but explains his whakapapa (lineage), his upbringing, his beliefs, and hopefully demonstrates that there are other ways to get on in life and to be successful. A New Zealander's Holocaust Mystery. "Every day, I am in Auschwitz," she would say. Even though she never had been. During the Holocaust, Lidi, as a teenager, flees from Hitler and the Nazis. Forced to leave behind everyone whom she loves, she eventually arrives in New Zealand as a Jewish refugee, with her mother. Alive in their new country, but labelled again, they immediately are called 'enemy aliens', monitored by the police, their letters censored, their lives and movements restricted. Five years later in 1945, a few months after the liberation of Auschwitz, Lidi burns the letter written to her that tells her what happened to those she loved most dearly. She hopes that in turning the letter to ashes, her survivor guilt and trauma would disappear too. But her efforts are in vain. "They - all those relations - just perished," Lidi says over and over again. Nearly 70 years later, just before she dies at the age of 92, Lidi said she regrets burning the letter. Too late. "They" remain a mystery to Helene, Lidi's daughter. As does their fate. For 50 years, she travels the world, searching for her grandparents and her "just perished" family. It was as if "they" all just disappeared in a puff of smoke. But she does find traces in the killing centres, ghettos and death marches across Poland, Czechoslovakia and Germany, discovering murder, suicides, theft, and tragic love affairs.

Drawing on more than 20 years of fieldwork for National Geographic, he shares experiences that range from diving with harp seals under the sea ice of the Gulf of St Lawrence to following the legendary 'sardine run' along South Africa's Wild Coast; from watching turret-building ghost crabs in Arabia to witnessing the impact of dynamite fi shing in the Philippines; from swimming with crocodiles in the Okavango Delta to fi nding seahorses on the Eastern Cape. From a myriad underwater encounters a wider conversation emerges about human engagement with the sea. One question dominates: How can we care for and reconnect with the oceans around us?

A young New Zealand nursing student is lunching in her college cafe in 1975 when an unknown 'Black man with a halo of corkscrew curls' sits uninvited next to her. Within a year, she marries the stranger in a traditional Solomon Islands' ceremony near the beach on which he was born, midway through his mother's four-hour walk to the clinic. Naked children and bare-breasted women greet the couple's arrival by canoe. She is the sole European at her wedding. Her only present is a shell. She discovers their home is a fibreboard house perched on stilts in a sea of mud on a muddy road. They bathe in a stream and fetch water from the river. The sea is the toilet. For most of the next forty years, this is her world - and the setting of the incredible story she reveals in Frigate Birds. Standards of health, nutrition, welfare and education are woefully low. But limited experience and basic knowledge are no deterrent as the young newlywed resolutely sets about improving the health and welfare of the islanders. She battles politicians, lawyers and health authorities. At home, she copes with bankruptcy, divorce and the birth of two sons.

Into the Woods shows us the healing power of nature through a story set in the New Zealand bush. This candid yet unexpectedly beautiful little book follows the journey a grieving mother goes through after losing a child. Feeling alienated from the people around her she physically and emotionally retreats into the bush where she forms a new and, for her, unlikely attachment to the native birds. The story starts with a woman sitting alone on her lawn. The flowers and visitors have stopped arriving and her husband has returned to work, leaving her to grieve for her lost baby alone. She opens a flyer newly arrived in the mail and sees pictures of native birds - the tui, the riroriro, the kereru - and having no one else to talk to starts to form a relationship with them. 'It was during the spring the kaka arrived that I first noticed a grey warbler fledgling outside my window who couldn't get the tune quite right. Voyages and Wanderings in Far-Off Seas and Lands / J. Inches Thomson; (Introducion by Rosy Fenwicke)

John Thomson's 'Voyages and Wanderings' begin in 1861 when at 17 he sets sail from Greenock, Scotland to start a new life on the other side of the world in Port Chalmers, New Zealand.

From his adventures as a 'new chum' on the Otago goldfields to his philosophical discussions with Te Whiti-o-Rongomai at Parihaka he reports his experiences with insight and humanity.

Then in 1877, along with the crew of the Bencleugh, he is shipwrecked on Macquarie Island. Before their rescue the men spend four winter months in the harsh sub-Antarctic environment where they must work together to ensure their survival or perish.

We meet sailors, pirates, whalers, and sealers as John recounts the beauty and danger of life under sail as he journeys around the coast of New Zealand and across the world's great oceans.

In her introduction, Rosy Fenwicke, John's great-great-great niece introduces the reader to the history of Māori in the southern most part of New Zealand up until the arrival from Scotland of the early settlers in the mid-nineteenth century. The New Zealand Company negotiated the sale of what would become Dunedin, the Edinburgh of the South and the deed was signed by twenty five Ngāi Tahu chiefs in 1844. Planned on Scottish principles of Presbyterianism, hard work and a focus on universal education, the settlers started arriving en masse in 1848. The Thomsons were one of the many Scottish families who sailed across oceans to make a new home for themselves and their descendents in Otago, New Zealand. This is their story too.

Have you ever wondered about the term 'full sheep'? Does this traditional, feisty, Chinese-Maori mix woman find acceptance in an industry that at the time choose mostly male-dominated ideas? A product of a dad who taught that you were equal to all if you had a job and worked at it hard, she did not change to that dominance. Viki's biography takes you back to a time that no longer exists. Browse through a photo collection that reflects her desire to honour the mates photographed long ago. Most don't include her, as she was the photographer. These are photos she kept in pristine condition. A few shearing sheds feature, but mostly the people who meant the world to her. The traditional industry of shearing sheep laid bare. Curiosity and sheer will were her super power (or got her through when others saw problems). Traveling barren roads for hours, unsure of what lay at the end, the only firm plan was to be away for weeks at a time.

The second part of the book contains 8 appendices covering another 75 pages and describing specific details related to the Club's history. Included are the names of Club Officers, Club Flying Instructors, Club trophies and holders, Club highlights and achievements over the years, aircraft operated by the Club and a detailed history and photograph of every aircraft that the Club has owned. Also in print for the first time is the story of the only Club member to have had his aircraft hijacked, written by the pilot himself.

This important book tilts the balance, unearthing a large and hitherto unknown number of women photographers, both professional and amateur, who operated in New Zealand from the 1860s to 1960, either as assistants in the early studios or later running studios in their own right. It takes the reader on a journey through the backrooms of nineteenth and early twentieth-century photographic studios, into private homes, out onto the street and up into the mountains, and looks at the range of photographic practices in which women were involved. Through superb images and fascinating individual stories, it brings an important group of photographers into the light.

By the time his first book, Beyond the Palisades, was published when he was eighteen, he had written more than 600 poems. His life's work, contained in this four-volume set, runs to just over 3000 poems, more than half of which have never before been published. John Weir, a fellow poet, friend and confidant of Baxter, has achieved the Herculean task of sorting these into a coherent order, noting where poems have been reworked or repurposed, their possible inspirations and influences, and Baxter's own thoughts about his work.

Koenraad Kuiper's poems are animated by a frugal, astringent, ironic intelligence that reminds me of when the word 'wit' was used to describe or even name the verse of the Metaphysical poets. However, these poems are not historical pastiche, but are unmistakably contemporary, as in the several formal variations of his 'Benedictine Sonnets'. Most of the poems belong in sequences and play with variations on themes, a cumulative strategy that complements and extends their laconic humour. From time to time a translation is included, in Dutch mostly but occasionally in German - sometimes the English reads as though it is the translated version, a deliberate, playful oddness. Erudite, witty, economical, and

Beautifully written and laced with sardonic Kiwi humour, the author's style is fluent and engaging; an easy read that deals with a difficult and often painful topic in a meaningful way.
