[Indonesia women have more often been the objects rather than the beneficiaries of development. While women are the key targets of population control, women are less likely to be the direct target of economic development programs.

On the other hand, when opportunities arise, not just men but women will also strike out on their own. They often start as self-employed, relying on unpaid family or household labor in non-organized enterprises. In all of this, however, women are socially considered by others as well as by themselves as subordinate to men. When their businesses grow, they are often taken over by their husbands.

Women have responded to the crisis through a more concerted effort to find work wherever it was available. My research has shown that women cannot and do not simply sit around bemoaning their fate. Instead, they have had to find alternatives,

even when they involve options that are difficult and often much worse than the conditions they faced during the boom times before the crisis.]
