The artists and traditions that have shaped contemporary Art in Myanmar are discussed in detail and the impact they have had on today's artists is demonstrated through discussions of the work of the leading artists in Myanmar today.]

preserving part of the country's heritage. The paintings by fifty-three artists shown in this book are part of probably the best and most comprehensive collection of paintings in Myanmar.]

Disease and demography in colonial Burma / Judith L. Richell Singapore: NUS publishing [NIAS press], c2006 xiv, 327 p.; 23 cm. Includes bibliography and index. 9971-69-301-1 \$ 33.00

[Disease and demography in colonial Burma is an examination of the factors that shaped demographic change in Burma between 1852 and 1941. Despite increasing contemporary interest in the historical demography of the non-European world, there has been little detailed exploration of Burma's extensive but problematic population records. Judith Richell developed a demographic framework for Burma by analysing late nineteenth to analyse population changes within the country. Colonial Burma experienced relatively high rates of mortality, and Richell related this phenomenon to nutrition, the development of sanitary and health services, the impact of migration from India, and agricultural change. She also assessed infant, child and adult mortality, the incidence of endemic diseases such as beri beri and malaria, and outbreaks of plague and cholera as well as influenza pandemic of 1918. The data the author collected and her discussion of these topics provide an exceptionally valuable resource for scholars interested in Burma, demography and public health in Southeast Asia.]

[In late 2004, Myanmar's best-known general and long-serving leader of the military regime, general Khin Nyunt, was suddenly dismissed. This shock development, perpetrated by a regime that has defied all predictions of its demise and disintegration, generated widespread uncertainly both inside and outside the country. Official re-assurances about continuing the 2003 "Road Map" process left many questions about the path ahead unanswered. Would political dialogue with opposition groups be resumed? How would increasingly restive ethnic groups respond? Would nascent civil society groups be able to play a role in national reconciliation? How would the new leadership deal with the flagging economy? What are the prospects for the large by under-funded and highly regulated agricultural sector? This book addresses these issues.]

[In view of its problematic human-rights record and the military regime's continued extra-constitutional rule, Myanmar has faced mounting diplomatic pressure from the international community since the renewed detention of Daw Aung San Suu Kyi in May 2003. This Adelphi paper examines Myanmar's foreign policy, which is predicated on state-building and development, as well as on defending the regime's priority of establishing an enduring constitution over democratization. It discusses how the regime has been able to take advantage of the economic, security and geostrategic interests of both China and India in the country to achieve developmental and security goals. As Western capitals have sought to place Myanmar under the scrutiny of the UN Security Council on the grounds that its domestic circumstances have regional security implications, the paper highlights how its relations with Beijing in particular have assumed ever greater significance. It discusses the regime's aims, disappointments and concerns in its relations with the US, Japan and Europe; details the difficult decisions facing the leadership as ASEAN has started to relax its application of the non-interference norm when dealing with Myanmar; and examines its interaction with the UN, particularly the secretarygeneral and his special envoys. The paper concludes by analyzing the likely regional and international implications of intensified political pressure on the regime.]

[Burmese puppetry is based on the author's PhD thesis analyzing puppets. He expanded the topic to include the wider framework of this art. As a long term resident of Rangoon he has close contacts with the craftsmen who make these beautiful marionettes, the puppeteers who perform with them and their modern brothers on state as well as the audiences who watch the shows. This book is the most comprehensive work on the subject in any language other than Burmese. He describes Burmese puppetry's glorious past, as well as its more recent situation. Once the most important dramatic art form, sponsored by the kings, it nearly fell

into oblivion in the 20th century due to competition from rival performing arts and the introduction of cinemas, and more recently video and finally DVD. In addition to vivid descriptions of traditional characters and themes of Burmese puppetry, the author draws parallels to related arts in neighbouring countries such as China, Indonesia, and Thailand. He also covers the impact of tourism and its influence on the revival of the marionette theatre. The aspect of craftsmanship involved in producing puppets is covered in detail making it of special value for museum curators and collectors of Burmese puppets. Photographs, line drawings, a detailed glossary, and references complete the text.]
