Thailand is a country with a rich cultural heritage especially evident in its woven costumes and textiles. The unique character of Lan Na culture, so different from that of coastal Southeast Asia, is reflected in the textiles and dress of its 19th century courts, and was developed through the integration of local cultures and societies living in the hills and valleys. In the court workshops, indigenous silk and cotton, Chinese silk, Burmese and Shan fabrics, rich embroideries and sumptuous trimmings, were used to create ceremonial court dress, while goldsmiths and silversmiths, wood carvers and lacquer makers produced court regalia. In this lavishly illustrated book, textile expert Susan Conway traces the history of the Lan Na princes, their complex marital and political alliances with the surrounding inland principalities and with Siam, China and Burma. A dramatic change in male court dress took place towards the end of the 19th century and acts as a metaphor for the political manoeuvres resulting from colonial intervention in the region. The book also shows how in such times, Lan Na princesses and their attendants continued to wear indigenous dress demonstrating loyalty to the culture they cherished.

Siam and the Vatican : In the Seventeenth Century

Author : Michael Smithies

Formal relations between Siam and the Vatican began in 1669 when Pope Clement IX sent a papal brief to King Narai, but informal relations go back to the early part of the previous century with the arrival of the Portuguese and their priests in Siam. Apostolic vicars were appointed by the pope in 1658 charged with extending missionary work in East Asia, and these, being French, became unwillingly involved in the political programmes of Louis XIV, the Jesuits and, after 1682, the ambitions of Phaulkon, the powerful Greek adventurer in Siam.

King Narai responded to the overtures of the Holy See by sending two diplomatic missions to Rome; only the second arrived, at the end of 1688, by which time the king was dead, Phaulkon executed, the Jesuits had removed, and the remaining French missionaries were imprisoned in a nationalist reaction to the political ambitions of Versailles.

Aung San, "the architect of Burma's freedom," was one of the most important political figures in the history of Burma's struggle for independence. Beginning as a student leader and activist in the 1930s, Aung San went on to assume prominent leadership positions in Burma's nationalist movement. At the beginning of World War II, he organized a clandestine trip to Japan in search of funds and military training in order to fight against British imperialism, but his close-knit group of "Thirty Comrades" found it necessary to resist not only the British, but also the Japanese. In the postwar years, Aung San became Burma's chief negotiator for independence from Britain, focusing much of his energy on promoting co-operation and unity among Burma's many minority ethnic groups. Early Mapping of Southeast Asia

Author : Thomas Suarez

Early Mapping of Southeast Asia documents the idea of Southeast Asia as a geographical and cosmological construct, from the earliest of times up until the dawn of the modern era. Using maps, itineraries, sailing instructions, travelers' tales, religious texts and other contemporary sources, it examines the representation of Southeast Asia, both from the historical perspective of Western exploration and cartography, and also through the eyes of Asian neighbors.

From the time of Herodotus and Alexander the Great to the medieval cosmologies of the Christian Fathers, Southeast Asia was as much a place of myth and legend in Western thought as it was a geographical reality. Later, with the rediscovery of Ptolemy's Geographia and the ground breaking journeys of Marco Polo and others like him, a more definite image of Southeast Asia began to inscribe itself in the contemporary cartographic record and paved the way for the great voyages of discovery in the 15th and early 16th centuries – Columbus and Bartolomeu Dias, Vasco da Gama and Magellan.

Author Thomas Suarez sympathetically relates the difficult task faced by the earliest mapmakers who had to fight against conflicting sources and their own prejudices to get Southeast Asia down on the map. He explains, for example, the peculiar continental peninsulas which suddenly appeared in the early 16th century, and why some parts of Southeast Asia subsequently washed up on the shores of Terra Australis. He also describes the growing popularity of printed maps in 17th century Europe and the rise of the East India Companies which ultimately led to the colonization of many parts of southeast Asia in the 18th and 19th centuries. Early Mapping follows the story through to the very end, closing with the exploration of the interior of the region as the final chapter in this fascinating account of southeast Asian geography and mapmaking.

Southeast Asia has always occupied a special place in the imaginations of East and West. For the Chinese, the islands of Southeast Asia lay in the 'southern ocean' while in India they were thought of as the 'lands below the wind'. The Customs of Cambodia

Zhou Dagan spent a year in Cambodia from 1296 to 1297 as part of a Chinese diplomatic mission sent by Timur Khan, the Grandson and successor of Kublai Khan, to the court of Indravarman III (reigned 1295 – 1308). The Khmer empire, though under attack, was still powerful and wealthy. Zhou wrote his account some time before 1312.

The Text was translated from Chinese into French by Paul Pelliot and published in 1902. It is here edited and newly translated from the French by Michael Smithies.

As Pelliot pointed out in his translation of the text in 1902, Zhou Dagan's is the only account to come down to us describing daily life in the Khmer empire. True, the empire had passed its zenith, and a fundamental shift to Theravada Buddhism was occurring, but that does not diminish its value. Seen in conjunction with the bas – reliefs at Angkor, Particularly the Bapuon, the Bayon, and Angkor war, the text tells us a good deal about how people lived then and how society was organized. Although it is undoubtedly occasionally inaccurate or incomplete – Zhou seems to have depended on members of the Chinese community in Angkor for some of his information, and many of his views were typical of those a Chinese male chauvinist – it is, as a record of daily life, considerably more informative than the numerous stele created in temples by Kings pompously proclaiming their greatness.

Cham Sculpture in the Tourane Museum (Da Nang, Vietnam) offers an overview of Cham art with Sixty – five photographs and an introductory text by the eminent French archaeologist Henri Parmentier. Originally published in 1922, this book remains one of the best introductions to the treasures preserved in the Tourane Museum in Danhang. It features splendid photographs of Cham art discovered in the main areas of this long lost culture – Mi Son, Dong Duong, Khuong My, and Tra Kieu. The development of Cham art is sketched against the background of Annamese migration pushing the Cham people and their kingdom ever further south. Descriptive features with examples of discovered pieces are given for Champa art during the original, cubic, derived, and decadent periods.

Religious Ceremonies and Superstitions of Champa consists of two research reports. The first one by Paul mus summarizes what is known about the religious practices of the cham people during various periods based on artifacts and translated inscriptions. The author also reviews the available evidence from contemporary Cham culture. The religious inheritance of Champa is related to Vedic, Indian, Chinese, and Annamese forms of Worship, and the significance of the Champa king as intermediary between the gods and the soil on which his people lived is also discussed.

A World under the Canopy

The Mrabri in laos : A world under the Canopy presents the first published information on the Mrabri living in laos collected during two years of preservation, development, and research activities. There are currently less than 400 living Mrabri

distributed between northern Thailand and the Lao PDR. The Mrabri have been studied in Thailand since 1919, but on the Lao side of the border no research was conducted until 1999. As of now there are only 28 Mrabri alive in the Lao PDR, with 22 of them maintaining their nomadic way of life in the primary forest of Sayabury Province. These last hunter – gatherers are among the most vulnerable of 300 million indigenous people worldwide. For the Mrabri the most important values are freedom and peace in the forest, and food availability. In recent history, the main enemies were human factors such as military events and misunderstandings, floods, illnesses, accidents and tigers. Since 1986 the number of Mrabri is stabilized at a very small number. Will they survive? Do they need to meet with their consins living in Thailand to be able to Survive? We expect and hope that two years of work to preserve the Mrabri at the institutional community levels will bear fruit.

Thailand has experienced considerable emigration flows over the past few decades ; however, due to economic growth over that period Thailand has become a receiving country, attracting many migrant workers from neighboring countries. Since around 1990 the government was faced with growing numbers of migrants and pressure to deal with problems associated with this movement. Migrant workers can now be found in almost all provinces; however, the economic crisis in 1997 had some impact on the migration streams and the influence of this economic downturn is still being felt as the government attempts to regulate the flow of workers, through new registration of workers and stricter enforcement procedures. The government is responding to increasing unemployment among Thais but employers argue that Thais do not want most of the jobs taken by migrants.
