[The Spirits of the Yellow Leaves – The Enigmatic Hunter-Gatherers of Northern Thailand is a colourful travel account and documentary work by the Austrian ethnographer and photographer Hugo A. Bernatzik. First published in German in 1938 under the title Die Geister der gelben Blatter it is long since out of print. This is an important work for several reasons and it is certainly worth publishing again. In the years 1936-37 Bernatzik traveled in both Southern and Northern Thailand and the Southern fringe of the Shan State, with a final excursion into Vietnam. In his book he gave interesting accounts of the ethnic groups he visited, Moken, Akha, Lisu, Biet and Others, all documented with outstanding photographs of lasting historical value. In the present edition additional photos from Bernatzik's collection have been added.

The work now appears in two volumes. The core of the present volume is a large section on an enigmatic and notoriously shy hunter-gatherer tribe called "the spirits of the Yellow Leaves". This ethnic group still exists both in Thailand and Laos, though it numbers only some 300 people. It is nowadays referred to as the "Yellow-Lead People" or as Malbri (mla 'Bri', literally: "forest people"). In his introduction to the volume Jorgen Rischel Places Bernatzik's intriguing account in the context of earlier and recent research. For decades there was controversy over the authenticity of his data; Rischel shows that the criticism was beside the point.]

[Moken and Semang is a new edition of the first part of the Austrian ethnographer and photographer Hugo A. Bernatzik's work the Spirits of the Yellow Leaves. Bernatzik's famous book on minorities in Thailand and beyond was originally published in 1938 and appeared in English translation in 1958. This first part was titled Mergui and South Thailand.

Jacques Ivanoff, a CNRs Scholar, who has been studying the Moken for a number of years and written several books on these so-called "Sea-gypsies", introduces the present volume with an analysis of Bernatzik's work. He also deals extensively with the situation of the Moken today, sixty years after Bernatzik did his study. Ivanoff describes how the Moken survived the Tsunami of December 2004, explaining how their preservation of traditional knowledge and culture enabled them to understand what happened at sea, before the disaster struck.

The Second part of Bernatzik's work is published separately under its original title, with an introduction about the author and his work by Prof. Jorgen Rischel, who also analyzes Bernatzik's data on the Malbri language.

The two most extensively documented ethnic groups in Bernatzik's work, the seabased Moken and the jungle dwellers Malbri, are of Malay and Mon-Khmer affiliation, respectively. Each group occupies a niche away from the mainstream societies, and they have done so for a long time, most likely on their own will.]

All three found expression in the local arts, including ceramics. [Thailand is usually closely associated with Buddhism, but since 1998 the country has been one of the observer members of the Islamic conference organization, and senior figures in the present and previous governments have been Muslim. Some 8 percent of the Population is Muslim, and in the three southernmost provinces of the country they constitute a majority. Islam is eve more visible in Bangkok, where the demographic increase of Muslims is marked. Michel Gilquin, a sociologist specializing in the study of Muslim societies and a resident of Morocco, examines the origins of Islam in the kingdom of Siam, Muslim integration into the Thai nation, and the effects of globalization and modernity on a mostly traditional and rural community. In particular he considers the weight of history of the old sultanate of Patani on the present-day Yawi-speaking majority in Narathiwat, Yala, and Pattani, and the circumstances leading to "the troubles" which erupted in 2004 and which, alas, continue. ["Khor Jor Kor: Forest Politics in Thailand" analyses the development of Thai forestry from the founding of the Royal forest department in 1896 up to the present day, focusing particularly on one of the most controversial state forestry programmes in Thai history, the military-led Khor Jor Kor project (1990-1992). The Khor Jor Kor project aimed to reorganise land use in all of Thailand's 1,253 national forest reserves. Behind the project was a powerful alliance of army generals, forestry officials, and pulp and paper companies. If it had gone through, thousands of families living in forest areas would have been evicted from their homes to make way for commercial plantations of eucalyptus. However, Khor Jor Kor led to massive conflict and sustained protects. Under the repressive conditions of the Suchinda dictatorship, farmers developed a civil disobedience strategy that finally stopped the project in July 1992. This book tells the story of that resistance movement and argues that it was a key link in the development of democratic forest management alternatives to the prevailing state and corporate models. At the same time, the book takes a fresh look at the historical development of forest politics in modern Thailand. Continuity and change in forestry are explained as the result of the rise and fall of different 'strategic groups', from British teak companies to the Royal Forest Department, from the Thai military to global pulp and paper conglomerates.]

[This book deals critically with the teachings of some major religions, but primarily with Christianity and Buddhism, to a lesser extent with Islam and by implication also Judaism. Its main thesis is that no religion can claim to be the only true religion without involving human society either in bitter conflict or in merciless persecution, as history certainly teaches us. Further more the author illustrates how such claims to absolute truth are often based on doctrines which may have little or nothing to do with teachings of the founder of a particular religion and which in terms of present-day knowledge of the history of the human race are no longer tenable. For instance he deals in some detail with the Christian doctrine of 'original sin' as the basis for the inter pretation of Jesus' crucifixion as a deliberate act of self-sacrifice. At the same

time, assisted by wide reading in biblical exegesis, he seeks to reinterpret the events of Jesus' life as a plausible historical account. The life of Mohammad, already well established historically, requires no such retelling, and so the author can writer of his teachings in a straightforward and notably sympathetic manner. However it will soon be clear to the reader that the primary interests of the author concern Buddhism, especially as related in its origins to the remarkable mystical insights of early Brahmanical sages. While showing little enthusiasm for present-day Hinduism, he interprets the term 'God' in Indian mythical terms, and in the last section of this book, a Final concept of God, he treats the Buddhist and Brahmanical ways of salvation as a quest which parallels and might well usefully inspire the researches of present-day scientists who probe the mysteries of time and space.]

[Lives in Transition by Ryoko Michinobu is an ethnographic study depicting the effects of social and cultural changes in the global economy on the lives and health of young Thai women who work for multinational factories at an industrial park in northern Thailand. The industrial park happens to be situated in a region where HIV/AIDS prevalence is among the highest in the country; hence the risk of HIV infection among young factory women has become one of the major concerns in the park. This study seeks to throw light on the situation, whereby moving to the industrial park – in the midst of the rapid development of a global capitalist economy – has resulted in an emerging risk of HIV among young factory women. The approach taken in the book is an interdisciplinary social science perspective with a
