Walter Irvine's account places his personal experiences against the political and cultural changes that surrounded the Lao and Cambodian revolutions of the 1970s and 80s, giving particular attention to refugee movements and their impact. Irvine's professional involvment as teacher in Laos, Social Anthropologist in Thailand and UNHCR official in Argentina gives him an insider's understanding of the specificity of culture, the dynamics of political change, the realities of forced exile, and the challenges of refugee work. His description of revisiting Indochina in 2016 puts the account of the earlier period into perspective. The text is illustrated with the author's photographs. A century ago, northern Thailand (or Siam, as it was then known) was home to small communities of westerners, many of them British diplomats and foresters (like Reginald Le May and Reginald Campbell) or American missionaries (like Lucy Starling and Mary Lou O'Brien). Though few in number, they left behind a considerable written legacy. Their writing is invariably personal and often vivid, describing their hopes and aspirations, the challenges they faced in their work and daily lives, and their attachment to this "enchanted land". This book makes a selection of that writing accessible to a wide readership, much of it for the first time. The texts are illustrated by 65 evocative photographs, many of them contemporary. Graham Jefcoate was born in England and studied English and Library Science in Cambridge and London. He has spent much of his adult life abroad, now a retired librarian living in Chiang Mai. He took an increasing interest in Thailand when he became Head of Early Printed Collections at the British Library in London in 1997, even became a member of the committee of the AngloThai Society. In recent years, he has become interested in the life of the Anglo-American community in Chiang Mai and the north of Thailand before the Pacific War and gave lectures and workshops from his research for Pavap University.

When he meets Yai Li – a healer from the slums who is grappling with her own past trauma – his inertia begins to shift. Southeast Asia, as a regional configuration of nation-states called ASEAN, is a community of multiple identities. Over time, its citizens' loyalties were formed around national and transnational frameworks involving ethnic, religious, and ideological affinities. In the post-

independence period, they were impacted by the processes of decolonization, nation-building, the Cold War, globalization, and the rise of China. As a result, Southeast Asia is emerging as a confluence of competing and overlapping identities.

Thus, in recent years, ASEAN has noticed the appearance of new collective imaginations about the region's future, committing its member states to directions beyond the politico-economic realm. Yet there is a risk that more exclusive visions among its people, whether national, religious, ethnic, or other allegiances, will hold sway.

This book unpacks these competing identities. Rich in ethnographic and historical material, its chapters examine identities shaped by generational markers, transnational linkages, and shared experiences of violence. Collectively, they point to the region's historical fractures and contemporary challenges.

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
