It is from this perennial source that all the socio-religious currents have flown and spread to the rest of the sub-continent and beyond eastward where they subsequently developed into multiforms. The cultural strata of the Western Himalayas has, thus, been composed of the sedimentary layers of diverse ethnic influences and socioreligious systems which, in the course of time, got blended and crystallised into a distinct cultural entity.

They are performed for the following purposes: (i) Blessing ceremonies associated with agricultural activities such as land clearing, planting and harvesting; (ii) Therapeutic healing ceremonies such as exorcism ceremonies to cleanse the village and to treat individual person afflicted with psychosomatic maladies; (iii) Thanks giving ceremonies for a bountiful harvest of crops of for a season's good catch of fish; (iv) Ceremonies of rite de passage (rite of passage) such as births, puberty, weddings and deaths; and (v) Special ceremonies to honor ancestor spirits, the recently departed and the moving of skulls to new locations. There are also dances performed without any ritualistic intent, but only for celebratory efficacies. They include secularized propitiatory and offertory dances serving mainly as entertainment during wedding festivities, cultural fairs, and

Some of these dances have been commercialized and packaged for tourist consumption. For such purpose, the dances have been capsulated to represent a panorama of traditional dances and performed at cultural villages such as in Sarawak and Sabah and also at five-star hotels frequented by tourists. In so doing the original choreography has been altered to accommodate modern tastes and sensibilities. As a result, these commercialized dances have lost their original purity that expresses the soul and spiritual dimensions of the community.

Names Fashioned by Gender is a collection of essays on onomastics-a linguistics field of study focusing on the origin, form, history and use of proper names. The study of naming potentially provides significant evidence about the role of gender in the assimilation and/or enculturation processes as personal names evoke insight into the construction of gender and personhood in African societies.

The book takes intellectual course from the idea that how names are viewed and used is heavily context-dependent and gendered. It demonstrates that personal names are narratives derived from different contexts within various cultures and circumstances subsequently imposing different identities on name bearers.
